

Located in Adelaide's iconic Lion Arts Centre precinct, Adelaide Contemporary Experimental (ACE) is South Australia's leading independent contemporary visual arts organisation, proudly supporting artists to develop and present work on Kaurna Yarta (Kaurna Country).

Established through the merger of Contemporary Art Centre of South Australia (CACSA) and the Australian Experimental Art Foundation (AEAF) in 2017, ACE builds upon the legacy of over 100 years of innovative experimental arts practice in South Australia. Through our exhibitions, studios, public programs, education, professional development opportunities and publications, ACE expands the edges of contemporary visual art practice, embraces diversity and provides a space for artists to take risks.

Our Approach to Programming

Since its inception, ACE's program has explored many timely issues, driven by the question: what is urgent to discuss today and who should be telling these stories? We recognise that contemporary art takes many forms, and have built a reputation for presenting new and important processes and methodologies for artistic practice.

Our Audiences

ACE believes everyone has a right to access artistic expression and take part in South Australia's cultural life. We invite audiences to experience contemporary art in an environment that is simultaneously engaging, challenging and welcoming. ACE is committed to ensuring our programs and activities are as accessible as possible, for as many people as possible.

Our Role in the Sector

ACE plays a vital role within the South Australian arts sector and cultural ecology, and champions best practice in a wide range of arts activities. We serve as a scaffold for building local artists' careers and are quickly growing a legacy of new work commissions which continue to circulate in galleries and collections across Australia. We believe that, by strongly supporting local artists and communities, and connecting them to our national and international peers, we can create greater opportunities and more expansive contexts for a diversity of art practitioners in South Australia.

Since joining ACE as Chair in October 2023, I have been inspired by the drive and dedication of both the team and the board and the incredible work of the artists we have hosted.

In another busy year in 2023, ACE hosted four curated exhibitions in the gallery, two offsite exhibitions; one at the Adelaide Botanic Gardens Museum of Economic Botany and the other at Firstdraft in Sydney, presented 30 public programs and events, and hosted five South Australian artists in the ACE Studio Program. Our education programs expanded along with access initiatives, we improved our volunteer program and established valuable new partnerships, including with the Adelaide Festival, Tarnanthi and the Sydney Biennale.

As part of our commitment to good governance, ACE developed our First Nations Advisory Committee to guide programs and initiatives with First Nations artists and communities. The Investment Fund Committee continued their excellent oversight of the Porter Street Investment Fund and facilitated a move to a local wealth management company that will ensure lower costs, better returns and the long-term security of the fund.

Artistic Director, Patrice Sharkey left in December after a five-year tenure to take up a new role at TarraWarra Museum of Art. Special thanks to Executive Director, Louise Dunn and to the ACE team for taking on a significant extra load while we searched for a replacement and welcome to our new Artistic Director, Danni Zuvela.

To the artists who participated in our programs in 2023, the audiences who attended exhibitions and events, our dedicated donors who underpinned our Studio Program and our partners who enriched our programs and enabled greater reach and artistic outcomes, thank you, and we can't wait to share what 2024 has in store.



Inspired by rivers that flow both ways, ACE partnered with the Biennale of Sydney to present a local response to the 23rd Biennale, titled rīvus (Latin for "stream"). Dedicated to nature and water-based ecologies, rīvus tackled many timely environmental themes including climate change and the effect of colonisation on First Peoples' custodianship of ecosystems.

ROCKAMORA was the first major gallery exhibition by multidisciplinary artist Kaspar Schmidt Mumm, which expanded the artist's fascination with puppetry as a tool for social change. Named after his mother's primary school bully, 'Rockamora' was portrayed as a thug taking a bath in the gallery. By feeding, cleaning, and caring for this bully, ROCKAMORA encouraged visitors to empathise with a larger-than-life, misunderstood antagonist as a way to counter lived experiences of harassment and discrimination.

Teresa Busuttil: Asleep with the Fishes

Presented by Firstdraft in Partnership with ACE.

Asleep with the Fishes takes its name from a Sicilian quote made popular by the film The Godfather (1972). To "sleep with the fishes" is to have one's corpse disposed of in a body of water.

The work examines the legacy of Teresa's late father, who was born on the Mediterranean archipelago nation, Malta, and migrated to South Australia by boat. Throughout his adult life, her father lived and worked as a diver, fisherman and professional criminal.

The work is a personal exploration of being multiple contradictory things at one time; both foreign and local, moral and criminal, honest and deceitful, combining fishing elements with symbols relating to religion and drugs to consider what really makes a person 'good'.

"I see my Aboriginalness and queerness all wrapped in my spirit" – Peter Waples-Crowe. An unapologetic celebration, PRIDE brought Aboriginal queer visibility to the fore and highlighted Peter's dedication to community.

Working across drawing, collage, sculpture and moving image, Peter's practice is largely based on personal experiences as influenced by his adoption and reconnection with his Ngarigo heritage, and over 25 years experience as a community health worker within Aboriginal and LGBTQIAP+ health. His work is a deep commentary on the world as a contested site for his multiple identities. For PRIDE, ACE commissioned a record 41 artworks including 3 by South Australian artists.

The Community of Practice

February – November 2023

Make your own leadlight artwork with Chelsea Farquhar

Workshop participants designed and made their own leadlight creations using copper foil, solder, and pre-cut glass shapes. Throughout these workshops, participants learned about this once-popular craft, exploring colour, texture, and the movement of light.

Overview



ACE is home to five fully-supported, rent-free CBD-based studios for South Australian artists.

The ACE Studio Program provides professional development opportunities, including studio visits with Australian and international curators; participation in public programs; mentorship by ACE staff; and prominent profiling and promotional opportunities.

It is the only program of its kind in the state and is an invaluable pathway for artists to gain national recognition. Working as part of a cohort of fellow artists, the Studio Program gives residents the space to experiment with their practice and grow their professional careers.

"The program is a generative and focused time that allows for discussions and feedback from studio peers, alongside studio visits from national and international artists and curators. This is especially nourishing and vital in a time where many artists are without a dedicated workspace and can feel isolated from their communities and networks."

Porter Street Commission

2024 Recipient: Lee Salomone

From 1964 until 2016, CACSA was the longest-running contemporary art space in Australia. It was created by the young artists of the Contemporary Art Society (CAS) – itself dating back to 1942. These artists recognised the need for a space of their own to freely experiment and present work to the public. So, in 1964, they purchased a fourbedroom villa at 14 Porter Street, Parkside to convert into an art gallery, and there it operated until the property was sold in 2018. The proceeds were invested to establish the Porter Street Fund, which honours the vision of the CAS artists and the legacy of CACSA.

Clear constitutional guidelines – determining that 50% of revenue be reinvested and the remainder spent to support artists and art practice – ensure that the fund serves the community for whom ACE exists, and that it will benefit South Australian artists for decades to come.

Commencing in 2021, the Porter Street Commission awards \$20,000 to a South Australian artist at any stage of their career to create an ambitious new work for presentation at ACE the following year. Made possible by the Porter Street Fund, it is open to those working across all contemporary art forms and is designed to support a significant next step in a South Australian artists' career and exhibiting trajectory.

The 2023 recipient Kaspar Schmidt Mumm's exhibition outcome, *Rockamora*, opened at ACE in June 2023. An array of public programs complemented this ambitious presentation, including live performances, workshops, tours and talks. Rockamora garnered impressive local and national media coverage, including a segment on ABC TV's flagship arts program, Art Works.

In August ACE announced Lee Salomone as the recipient of the 2024 Commission. Applications for the 2024 Porter Street Commission were considered by a selection panel composed of ACE's Associate Curator Rayleen Forester; Clothilde Bullen (Curator and Head of Indigenous Programs at the Art Gallery of Western Australia); and Billy Tang (Executive Director & Curator at Para Site, Hong Kong).
